Philosophy





What you'll study

Students without any background in philosophy can choose to follow one or more of the introductory papers taught to firstyear students: Introductory Logic, General Philosophy and Moral Philosophy. Students with some previous experience of philosophy can choose papers from a range of some thirty options depending on their interests and background. Certain option papers offer the opportunity to study the work of some of the world's great thinkers, for example, Plato, Aristotle, Kant, or Wittgenstein. Others papers focus on particular areas of philosophy such as Ethics, Aesthetics, Philosophy of Mind or Metaphysics and Epistemology.

Why study Philosophy at St Anne's?

Studying philosophy is a way of acquiring a mental toolkit. It will help you argue and express yourself more clearly, engage and assess other people's arguments more rigorously, and learn to think in new and more imaginative ways. Philosophy also affords an opportunity to read and engage with some of the greatest thinkers in recorded history. Finally, and perhaps most importantly, philosophy allows you the chance to think hard and slowly about issues that really matter to you.

St Anne's is a wonderful place to study philosophy. It has two permanent members of academic staff in Philosophy, Professors Roger Crisp and Ian Phillips, who between them have expertise across a very wide range of subjects from Moral and Ancient Philosophy to Philosophy of Mind and Cognitive Science. You'll find yourself part of a very friendly group of talented but down-to-earth students. You'll also have access to one of the best philosophy collections of any College library in Oxford!

- Lectures Typically 2 per week.
